



National POW/MIA Recognition Day September 16, 2016

In the United States, National POW/MIA
Recognition Day is observed on the third Friday in
September. It honors those who were Prisoners of
War and those who are still Missing in Action.
This observance is one of six days throughout
the year that Congress has mandated the flying
of the POW/MIA flag. The others are Armed
Forces Day, Memorial Day, Flag Day,
Independence Day and Veterans Day.

The flag is to be flown at major military installations, national cemeteries, all post offices, VA medical facilities, the World War II Memorial, Korean War Veterans Memorial, the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, the official offices of the secretaries of state, defense and veterans affairs, the director of the selective service system and the White House. A Pentagon ceremony featuring members of each branch of military service is held annually on National POW/MIA Recognition Day. This year it will be held Friday, Sept. 16, 2016.

This day was established by an Act of Congress, by the passage of Section 1082 of the 1998 Defense Authorization Act. The POW/MIA flag was first recognized by Public Law 101-355 in 1990.

The original Toxic Exposure Act of 2016 (H.R. 1769 / 5-901) went from 19 pages to 331 pages when it was merged with a number of other Veteran related legislation.

The new H.R. 5286 was pulled from the floor by the VFW and DAV shortly before it was to be voted on. If this legislation is not voted on be and passed this summer we will have to start over again in January with the new congress.

Purple Heart Phone Scam: The Military Order of the Purple Heart is warning about a telephone scam being conducted in its name. Unknown individuals have been cold-calling people across the United States, often from 315-516-2512, and requesting donations for the upcoming presidential election. The callers say they're doing so on behalf of MOPH and mention the name of the group's national commander, Robert Puskar. "These calls are a hoax," read a MOPH statement, which asks people to contact local authorities if they receive such calls.

Air Force Established 1947

The United States Air Force became a separate military service on September 18, 1947, with the implementation of the National Security Act of 1947. The Act created the National Military Establishment, later renamed the Dept. of Defense, which was composed of three branches, the Army, Navy and a newly created Air Force. Prior to 1947, the responsibility for military aviation was divided between the Army (for land-based operations) and the Navy, for sea-based operations from carrier nd amphibious aircraft.

Although not officially Air Force Pilots --WOMEN AIR FORCE SERVICE PILOTS (WASP) was a paramilitary organization. The WASP's predecessors, the Women's Flying Training Detachment (WFTD) and the Women's Auxiliary Ferrying Squadron (WAFS) organized separately in September 1942. They were the pioneering organizations of civilian female pilots, employed to fly military aircraft under the direction of the U.S. Army Air Force during WWII. The WFTD and WAFS were merged on August 5, 1943, to create the paramilitary WASP organization. The female pilots of the WASP ended up numbering 1,074, each freeing a male pilot for combat service and duties. They flew over 60 million miles in every

type of military aircraft. The WASP was granted veteran status in 1977, and given the Congressional Gold Medal in 2009.

Vietnam Veterans Memorial traveling wall comes to Geauga County

The early morning rain didn't stop the two groups of motorcyclists from gathering to carry out a duty they were honored to have.

The rain stopped and sun came out Sept. 8 just as motorcyclists from the Red Knights chapters 1 and 9 and Rolling Thunder Chapter 1 assembled into formation along with two Geauga Park District Ranger units and four Geauga County Sheriff's deputies to start their escort.

Minutes later the roar of 16 motorcycles and a semi-truck echoed along the 20-mile route from Observatory Park in Montville Township to the Geauga County Fairgrounds in Burton Township. The Wall that Heals, the half-scale traveling replica of The Vietnam Veterans Memorial, was making its way to an exhibition at the fairgrounds.

Created by the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund, the wall has been traveling the country for 20 years but this visit marks the first to Geauga County.

The wall was brought in by Geauga Park District and Geauga Veterans' Services Commission in collaboration with Geauga County Fairgrounds.

"Our hope is that this will be a time of healing for many," said John Oros, executive director of the Park District. "I met a Vietnam veteran earlier today who has not had the opportunity to go to Washington, D.C., so this is his first time ever seeing The Wall. This is just a great honor and privilege."

Organizers expect it to draw thousands of people over its four-day stay at the fairgrounds, located at 14373 Cheshire St.

The exhibit, which is open to visitors 24 hours a day, features a 250-foot, half-scale replica of the wall with all 58,249 names of the soldiers either killed in action or missing in action during the Vietnam War. Visitors looking to find a particular name on The Wall will have access to the name directory displaying the panel number and line number where the name can be found. Also available for viewing is a mobile education with digital 6-foot screens that tell the Vietnam War and memorial's history.

There will be three screens featuring faces of Vietnam soldiers and these include listing the names of soldiers on the wall who have a birthday on the date of display, the names and photos if available of any local soldiers on the wall and the names and photo if available of those who died as a result of the war but not during the war, such as those who came home but died from Agent Orange exposure or other injuries.

Visitors are encouraged to bring photos of friends and family named on the wall to be scanned and included into the Education Center.

These are newly added to the exhibit and just unveiled three weeks ago, according to Tim Tetz, Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund's director of outreach.

Additionally there are three windows for viewing items left at the memorial in Washington. These items are on loan to the traveling wall.

The idea of The Wall that Heals came in 1997, from Jan Scruggs, the man who inspired the memorial in Washington, according to Tetz.

"Scruggs realized that everyone was not going to be able to see the wall and decided that a traveling wall needed to be built, that represents the emotions that you would get in D.C.," said Tetz.

"Although there are multiple walls, which is a good thing because this isn't a competition, The Wall that Heals is the only wall affiliated with The Vietnam Veterans Memorial in D.C.," said Patrick O'Neill, the Memorial Fund's site supervisor,


The wall takes approximately 15 to 20 people four hours to assemble. Once emptied, the 53-foot-trailer that transports it converts to the Mobile Education Center for visitors.


Multiple events will be occurring during the exhibition. An opening ceremony on Sept. 8 featured a color guard, laying of a wreath, and the reading of names of Geauga County residents killed in action.

Sept. 9 will be Education Day, Sept. 10 is Scout Day and the exhibit ends with a closing ceremony starting at 3 p.m. Sept. 11.

Linda Richard, a visitor to the wall, was 18 when her brother was killed in a helicopter crash in Vietnam on Thanksgiving Day in 1970, three weeks before he was scheduled to come home and be married.

"This is the best tribute for Vietnam we have ever done because you know how they were treated when they came home," said Richard, who is planning on volunteering at The Wall. "This is very special to me and the fact that it is here."

The actual event occupied the first floor area of the main parking garage which provided protection from any type of adverse weather conditions. Although a hot and humid day, the garage provides its own unique cooling and ventilation effect due to its construction. Two 48" fans from the Maintenance Department at the hospital also kept a steady breeze flowing for the patient's personal comfort while eating and enjoying the entertainment provided during the day.

Many veterans made a special effort to stop by the Rolling Thunder Chapter 1 Chair of Honor that was set up in the dining area. Also present was a special motorcycle display by Massillon, Ohio native and Viet Nam

Vet, Ken McGill. Ken, a 1966 graduate of Perry High School in Massillon went into the service after graduation along with numerous other classmates of that era. Eleven of these friends, including his best friend, unfortunately, did not return having made the ultimate sacrifice. Ken took it upon himself, over several years, to build a tribute bike from a 1968 Harley Davidson basket case he discovered in their honor. Beautifully hand crafted, the bike also boasts electrified paint on the tank and rear fender that illuminates from a remote pocket fob he carries. A combat soldier on the tank and the names of the 11 lost veteran classmates glow on command.....a very moving tribute. Ken was constantly interacting with the patients telling his story and listening to theirs. It was a memorable day for all attendees.
