They are expecting a crowd so we are meeting early to place our specific wreathes before the ceremonies and public placement. I requested 30 wreathes for us to lay on specific graves. We will need to work with the trucks/administrators to get those early.

Sunday, December 17, 2023 - Membership meeting 2:00 p.m. - Chapter Christmas party

This year's Christmas party will be a pot luck affair, spouses and significant others are included. The chapter will provide ham and rolls.

In addition to the shared meal we are going to play a game called "White Elephant." The way the game is played is this.

Bring 3-4 wrapped gifts per person. These can be dollar store items or that stuff you got in an office gift exchange or some garage sale item you could not unload. Please keep the cost as low as possible. The intent is to have fun "exchanging" these gifts.





- 9. H.R.411 Lead by Example Act of 2023 118th Congress (2023-2024) | BILL Sponsor: Rep. Davidson, Warren [R-OH-8] (Introduced 01/20/2023) Committees: House - House Administration; Veterans' Affairs
- (a) Health Care Benefits.—Notwithstanding any other provision of law, beginning January 3, 2025, the only health care plan that the Federal Government may make available to Members of Congress and Congressional staff with respect to their service as a Member of Congress or Congressional staff shall be health care provided through the Department of

Veterans Affairs, including at facilities of the Department and non-Department facilities pursuant to chapter 17 of title 38, United States Code, and any other provision of law authorizing the Secretary of Veterans Affairs to furnish such care to veterans, as if such Members and staff were veterans.

There are no Ohio co-sponsors currently. (I think this is a really good one. Make sure that you contact your representatives to make sure this one happens. Maybe it will lead to some major changes in the health care of veterans.)

<u>H.R.542</u> - This bill addresses home care and caregiver programs provided by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). There are currently 72 co-sponsors, one from Ohio.

10. S-132--Pilot Program Required.—The Secretary of Defense and the Secretary of Veterans Affairs shall jointly carry out a pilot program to assess the feasibility and advisability of providing the module described in subsection (b) and services under subsection (c) as part of the pre-separation transition process for members of the Armed Forces as a means of reducing the incidence of suicide among veterans.

(This bill is sponsored by Ohio Senator Sherrod Brown. To date, there are 8 cosponsors.)

H.R.1282 - Major Richard Star Act - This bill provides that combat-disabled uniformed services retirees with fewer than 20 years of creditable service may concurrently receive, without reduction, veterans' disability compensation and retired pay or combat-related special compensation. 9 co-sponsors from Ohio.

Give Hope This Holiday Season

Check in and spend time with the veterans in your life.

In the past, as the holidays approached, I worried about gift buying, digging out decorations and wondering how I'd navigate the obligation of an entire month's worth of social gatherings.

This year though, I'm determined to do things differently. While many people are going to spend the next few weeks trying to live up to impossible expectations, I'm going to focus on the one thing that could have the most impact on someone's life, including my own: hope.

Giving Hope

Some Veterans I know are very social.

Others tend to be more introverted. Some would like to be more social but haven't been able to find the right balance that works for them.

If you're more outgoing and know a Veteran who tends to be alone most of the time, consider inviting them to meet up over the holidays. Get together for coffee or maybe see a movie.

If you don't live close to the Veterans you know, make sure you call or text them regularly. I know from experience that, for many people, the gift of your time means more than any material item you could wrap up for them. And for Veterans who may be struggling around the holidays, knowing they have a support network can reduce their risk for suicide.

Give hope to your Veteran loved ones who may be lonely.

Be Prepared to Offer Support

While talking with your Veteran loved one, they might tell you they're going through a rough time. This is when you need to take action. Be prepared to listen to what they want to tell you. When it comes to responding to a Veteran, remember that simple, encouraging feedback goes a long way in showing support and encouraging help-seeking:

- "I'm here for you. How do you hurt and how can I help?"
- "I might not be able to understand exactly what you're going through or how

you feel, but I'm here to listen and want to help."

Make sure they know the Veterans Crisis Line is available 24/7 to help during a crisis. You can even call together. To reach responders 24/7, <u>Dial 988 then Press 1</u>, chat at VeteransCrisisLine.net/Chat or text 838255.

Know How To Find Local Resources

So far, I've talked about what are called "upstream" resources. These are resources that are supposed to help Veterans before a crisis strikes.

Another upstream resource that's helpful for Veterans and those who care about them is our Resource Locator tool, which is a guide to clinical resources like VA's suicide prevention coordinators, crisis centers, medical centers, outpatient clinics, Vet Centers and benefits offices.

To use this tool, visit the <u>Local Resources</u> page on the Veterans Crisis Line website. Scroll down to the "Search Local VA Resources" box. Here, you can enter your ZIP code and distance parameters. You can search from 10-300 miles from your ZIP code.

No matter what the Veteran you care about is experiencing, VA can connect them with resources and support systems to help.

A Simple Gesture Could be Life Changing

It's easy to get caught up in the stress of the holidays, but you don't have to let your life revolve around gifts and parties and a never-ending to-do list. This year, give hope to a Veteran you know.

Check in with those you served with. It can be as simple as a phone call or text. If you can, meet up in person. Focus on the things you can't buy: Time and support. That's what matters to Veterans facing a challenge.

The Christmas Star

When they saw the star, they were overjoyed.

<u>Matthew 2:10</u>

"If you find that star, you can always find your way home." Those were my father's words when he taught me how to locate the North Star as a child. Dad had served in the armed forces during wartime, and there were moments when his life depended on being able to navigate by the night sky. So he made sure I knew the names and locations of several constellations, but it was being able to find Polaris that mattered most of all. Knowing that star's location meant I could gain a sense of direction wherever I was and find where I was supposed to be.

Scripture tells of another star of vital importance. "Magi from the east," learned men (from an area encompassed by Iran and Iraq today) had been watching for signs in the sky of the birth of the One who was to be God's king for His people. They came to Jerusalem asking "Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him" (Matthew 2:1-2).
